St Patrick's Creed (from his "Confessions". We can see in it great similarities to the Nicene Creed)

There is no other God, nor will there ever be, nor was there ever, except God the Father.

He is the one who has not begotten, the one without a beginning, the one from whom all beginnings come,

the one who holds all things in being; this is our teaching.

And his son, Jesus Christ, whom we testify has always been, since before the beginning of this age,

with the Father in a spiritual way.

He was begotten in an indescribable way before every beginning. Everything we can see, and everything beyond our sight, was made through him.

He became a human being; and having overcome death, was welcomed to the heavens by the Father.

The Father gave him all power over every being, both heavenly and earthly and beneath the earth.

Let every tongue confess that Jesus Christ, in whom we believe and whom we await to come back to us in the near future, is Lord and God.

He is judge of the living and of the dead; he rewards every person according to their deeds; He has generously poured on us the Holy Spirit, the gift of promise of immortality, who makes believers and those who listen to be children of God and co-heirs with Christ. This is the one we acknowledge and adore – one God in a trinity of the sacred name.

Speak to us about God:

There is a story told about Patrick in the Book of Armagh which comes to us from the 7th century. It tells of a noble woman Ethne Alba and her sister Fidelma, daughters of King Laoghaire of Connacht, who are said to have met Patrick and his bishops at the Holy well near Tulsk, in County Roscommon. The women did not know who the men were, nor their religion, and they asked the following questions:

"Who is God and where is God
Of whom is God, and where is God's house?
Has your God sons and daughters?
Gold and Silver? Is God alive forever?
Is God in heaven or on earth?
In the sea, in the rivers,
In the mountains, in the Valleys?
Speak to us about God, Give us some idea of God.
How may God be seen? How may he be loved?
How may he be found?
Is God found in Youth or Old Age?
Speak to us of God."

And Patrick replied:

Our God - God of All people

God of heaven and earth of the sea and of the rivers

God of the Sun and the moon and of all the stars,

God of the high mountains and of the deep valleys.

God is above heaven and in heaven and under heaven

God has as His dwelling place heaven and earth and the sea and all that are in them.

God's life is in all things;

God inspires all things,

God governs all things,

God supports all things.

God kindles the light of the sun,

God creates the light of the moon and stars.

He makes wells in the arid earth and rocky islands in the sea.

God has a Son who is co-eternal with him and of like nature.

The Son is not younger than the Father

nor the Father than the Son;

and the Holy Spirit breathes in Them.

Not separate are the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

From St Patrick's 'Confession'

#12 I was like a stone lying deep in the mud. Then he who is powerful came and in his mercy pulled me out, and lifted me up and placed me on the very top of the wall. That is why I must shout aloud in return to the Lord for such great good deeds...

17 It was in the strength of God that I went – God who turned the direction of my life to good...
