What is Ministry?

- Ministry can be defined as 'serving one another'.
- Jesus is our model and exemplar: 'The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve.' (Mk 10:45)
- Ministry is a share in Christ's self-offering and selfgiving. Our service and self-giving reflects the nature of God's inner life of mutual self-giving and receiving.
- Ministry is not just something practical (a job, a role) but a spirituality (a service, a vocation).
- Active participation of the People of God clergy, religious and lay people is essential to the life, leadership and decision-making of our Parish.

Where it comes from:

Ministry is the way in which the Church continues what Christ began and still intends, namely, the salvation of humanity and the transformation of the world. All baptized and confirmed Christians receive a call and gifts enabling them to participate in this mission. All ministries flow from Baptism and Confirmation. Through Baptism & anointing with Chrism (priest, prophet and king) we share in the priestly ministry of Christ.

All the baptized are called to work toward the transformation of the world. Most do this by working in secular roles; some do this by working in the Church and focusing on the building of parish community, which has among its purposes the transformation of the world.

The possibility that lay persons undertake Church ministries can be grounded in Scripture and the teachings of the Church, from St. Paul to the Second Vatican Council. In more recent documents such as the Synod Reports and the Building Hope Task Force Report, the need for Lay Ministry has become more important moving forward.

Lay Ministry in the Synodal Pathway

In both the Diocesan and National reports there is a calling for greater involvement of the laity.
