WHAT IS HOPE?

Hope is the power by which we firmly and constantly long for what we were placed on earth to do:

to praise God and serve God
to find our fulfilment and true happiness in God
to keep in mind our final home in God. (YOUCAT, 308)

Hope is trusting in what God has promised us
in creation
in the prophets
but especially in Jesus Christ,
even though we do not yet see it. (YOUCAT, 308)

Hope is Kingdom directed,
it is humankind's encourager,
it sustains us in times of abandonment,
it opens our heart to expect eternal life.

Hope energises us,
preserves us from selfishness
and leads to the happiness that flows from charity. (CCC 1818)



WHAT IS CHRISTIAN HOPE?

Christian hope has its origin in the hope of the chosen people of God and the hope of Abraham. 'Hoping against hope, he believed, and so became the Father of many nations.' (CCC 1819, Romans 4:18)

Christian hope unfolds from the beginning of Jesus' preaching in the proclamation of the Beatitudes.

The beatitudes raise our hope towards a new path, leading through the trials that await the disciples of Jesus. (CCC1820)

Hope is the sure and steadfast anchor of the soul. (Hebrews 6: 19-20)

Hope is like the protective clothing for the Christian. 'Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation.' (1 Thessalonians 5:8)

Hope is joy even in times of trial: 'Rejoice in your hope, be patient in tribulation.' (Romans 12:12)

Hope is expressed and nourished in prayer, especially in the Our Father, the summary of all that hope leads us to desire. (CCC 1820)

We hope in the glory of heaven promised to all those who love God and do God's will. (CCC 1821)

We hope, with God's grace to continue to the end. (Romans 8: 28-30)

We pray in hope that all people will be saved. (1 Timothy 2:4)

Words of Hope from Pope Francis

From Hope does not disappoint, Bull of Indiction of the Ordinary Jubilee of the Year 2025

Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring.

Hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the cross.

Patience, one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit, sustains our hope and strengthens it as a virtue and a way of life. May we learn to pray frequently for the grace of patience, which is both the daughter of hope and at the same time its firm foundation.

We need to recognize the immense goodness present in our world, lest we be tempted to think ourselves overwhelmed by evil and violence. The signs of the times, which include the yearning of human hearts in need of God's saving presence, ought to become signs of hope.

The first sign of hope should be the desire for peace in our world, which once more finds itself immersed in the tragedy of war.

I ask with all my heart that hope be granted to the billions of the poor, who often lack the essentials of life. Before the constant tide of new forms of impoverishment, we can easily grow inured and resigned. Yet we must not close our eyes to the dramatic situations that we now encounter all around us, not only in certain parts of the world. Each day we meet people who are poor or impoverished; they may even be our next-door neighbours.

All of us, however, need to recover the joy of living, since men and women, created in the image and likeness of God (cf. Gen 1:26), cannot rest content with getting along one day at a time, settling for the here and now and seeking fulfilment in material realities alone.

All the baptized, with their respective charisms and ministries, are coresponsible for ensuring that manifold signs of hope bear witness to God's presence in the world.

Surely we need to "abound in hope" (cf. Rom 15:13), so that we may bear credible and attractive witness to the faith and love that dwell in our hearts; that our faith may be joyful and our charity enthusiastic; and that each of us may be able to offer a smile, a small gesture of friendship, a kind look, a ready ear, a good deed, in the knowledge that, in the Spirit of Jesus, these can become, for those who receive them, rich seeds of hope.

Hope finds its supreme witness in the Mother of God. In the Blessed Virgin, we see that hope is not naive optimism but a gift of grace amid the realities of life.

The image of the anchor is eloquent; it helps us to recognize the stability and security that is ours amid the troubled waters of this life, provided we entrust ourselves to the Lord Jesus. The storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death.

May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope, a harbinger of new heavens and a new earth (cf. 2 Pet 3:13), where men and women will dwell in justice and harmony, in joyful expectation of the fulfilment of the Lord's promises.

Blessed are those who pray and work for full communion between Christians.

Examination of Conscience

Inspired by the Beatitudes of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5:1-12) and the Six Beatitudes of Pope Francis (2016)

1. Blessed are those who remain faithful while enduring evils inflicted on them by others and forgive them from their heart.

Forgive and forget is easier said than done. Showing divine mercy when utterly provoked and persecuted calls for great conviction. We witnessed the example of Jesus on the cross and the many stories of extraordinary forgiveness as people estranged for years cross the bridge of hope and reconciliation.

If we have failed to embody compassionate forgiveness we ask for mercy.

2. Blessed are those who look into the eyes of the abandoned and marginalized and show them their closeness.

Sometimes we find it easier to pass by on the other side than face the person begging at the train station, outside the bank or the shop. By not meeting their eyes their pain may be compounded. We can never underestimate the power of sharing the eyes of acceptance. Turning off an advertisement or an appeal for help because we can't face the pain of the other is turning our back on Jesus who modelled selfless love.

If we have failed to meet the eyes of those who are in need, we beg for mercy.

3. Blessed are those who see God in every person and strive to make others also discover him.

When we look in the mirror do we recognise the face of our Creator? If we can't do that then we will have difficulty in recognising God in others. When we allow another to disrespect someone without making comment we are guilty of cowardice and adding to their suffering. We were all created with dignity and are worthy of respect.

If we have failed to stand up for the rights and dignity of others we say sorry.

4. Blessed are those who protect and care for our common home.

It has taken catastrophic weather and a dangerous loss of biodiversity for many people to wake up to the crisis around us. It all begins with our failure to recognise the connectedness of all life and the interdependency of all species. Many climate warriors have faced ridicule, imprisonment, oppression because they speak the truth about our environment. They are indeed blessed for their persistence in proclaiming our common home in the face of such opposition.

If we have failed to care of our common home we hold our heads in shame.

All sing: Lord, have mercy

5. Blessed are those who renounce their own comfort in order to help others.

Our Christian history tells us of the women and men who answered the call to follow Jesus by a life of simplicity for the sake of others. Heroes and heroines are not all in the past. They are around us in the many organisations that support people who are lacking in comfort and nourishment today. Take a moment to think of the various charities who depend on the generosity of their supporters.

If we have failed to support those who sacrifice themselves we ask for pardon.

6. Blessed are those who pray and work for full communion between Christians

We have only to look at the religious divisions and the economic consequences of the conflicts on our own island to appreciate the immensity of the issue around full communion between Christians throughout the world. We can walk that road of harmony by educating ourselves about the issues and praying for such a wonderful communion in the name of Jesus Christ, our saviour.

If we have failed to give this cause our attention and respect we are truly sorry.
